Progress on two major Parish Council led projects

BMX Pump Track

Hayfield Parish Council are delighted that we are now able to sign a contract with the firm Bike Track to build the long proposed BMX pump track. Following a successful bid to secure a Big Lottery grant of nearly £10,000 towards the cost of the track on the play area next to the skate park, funds were generously gifted to the council to ensure that the project could take place in addition to nearly £4,000 from Hayfield Educational Trust and a grant from Awards for All. Hayfield Quarry have very kindly offered to provide the materials to build up the track.

There will be a bench and seating area included in the park to commemorate Charlie Craig, who was instrumental in getting this project off ground originally.

The work will cause some disruption to the use of the existing playground for perhaps two weeks and will include propping the bridge in the park near the cricket club wall. that they will make good the site afterwards.

Bank Vale playing field



Hayfield Parish Council are finally in a position to announce, that the signing of the 30-year lease for Bank Vale playing field is imminent. This will mean that the Council can officially lease the ground to the Hayfield Community Sports and Football Club, which in turn will enable them to raise funds and build the changing rooms and facilities they have long needed to further develop the club.





The 2017 Hayfield Summer Show

Organised by the Hayfield Allotment Society (HAS) and sponsored by HAS and the Parish Council, the show was held on the 2nd of September in the village hall. It was a well supported and social gathering, with 138 entries and a large number of visitors. Wright Turner Party

Councillor Eva Lawson has again organised a very successful annual Wright Turner party, something she has done for over 20 years.

In the mid 19th Century, Wright Turner was a Hayfield resident who moved out of the village to live in Salford. He led a very successful life there and eventually become Mayor for two consecutive years. However, he never forgot his roots in the village and set up a trust to fund an annual party for the 'old folks' of the village. As health and life expectancy were much lower in those days, 'old folks' was defined as anyone over 50!

The annual party still takes place but focusses on residents of Primrose Court. It is sponsored by the Parish Council and was attended by over 35 people as well as by the Chair of the Parish Council, the Deputy Mayor and Mayoress of High Peak Borough, the vicar of St Matthew's Church, the minister of St John's Chapel, DCC Councillor Beth Atkins and our very own May Queen and May King. It was a very enjoyable meal, rounded off with speeches by David Toft, Chair of the Parish Council and Revd John Hudghton, the vicar of St Matthew's. Those residents of Primrose Court who were too unwell to attend were taken meals in boxes.

In the evening there was a lively concert by the excellent Tideswell Male Voice Choir, who entertained a packed audience in St Matthew's Church to end a really great day for everyone involved, especially the guests from Primrose Court. The Parish Council thanks all involved in organising and helping on the day.

Telecom Mast Victory

In July the Parish Council led and coordinated a very effective campaign against the siting of a telecom mast which was proposed to be erected in an obtrusive and completely inappropriate site



near the crossing into the village from the bus station. We worked closely with groups such as the Hayfield Civic Trust and were given excellent support by Councillor Peter Easter in his roles as High Peak Borough and Parish Council and also local Councillor and leader of High Peak Borough council, Tony Ashton. DCC Councillor Beth Atkins also supported our campaign. Chair of the Parish Council, David Toft, appeared on High Peak Radio and also

addressed the full Planning Committee, supported on the day by Councillor Easter and Jo Toft representing the Civic Trust. This was a great example of how effective we can be when everyone works together for the good of our community.

WW1 centenary anniversary

Himalayan Balsam

This plant, with pretty pink flowers, grows freely along river banks and damp spaces. It has attractive flowers and foliage but it poses a real threat. It is a non-native weed, which outcompetes all other vegetation. According to the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981, it is 'illegal to plant *or allow to grow* (Himalayan Balsam) in the wild'. The reason is that when it takes hold it spreads rapidly. Once it is in flower, it is important to try and get rid of it as soon as possible, because when the flowers turn to seed, they can scatter up to 800 seeds a distance of up to 17m. It's very easy to get rid of this plant: all you have to do is pull it up, snap it and leave it to die. It will come up very easily indeed due to its shallow roots. Alongside Sustainable Hayfield, we hope to convene a 'Balsam Bash' event next summer. **Watch this space!**

HIGHWAYS NEWS: Councillor Easter has been very active in following up widespread complaints about potholes and poor road and pavement surfacing. Resurfacing on Kinder Road is complete and the plan is to get Market Street and Church Street done as soon as possible.

Street Lighting

People have been complaining about poor street lighting in some places and in particular the fact that bulbs are not being replaced when they fail. Street lights are the responsibility of Derbyshire County Council and they have explained that they are in the process of upgrading all 68,000 street lights. New LED lights, with a life of around 25 years will replace the old orange sodium bulbs, which lasted about 4 years, saving £1.2 million per year.
